Most of the screenwriting process takes place away from a keyboard and desk. The story, the situations, character introductions, subplots, pivot points, set-ups, "gags," transitions, edits, scene descriptions, etc. are all thought about long before the writer downloads screenwriting software onto their computer. Many times—if not most—the ending is known before the beginning is known.

Of the 26 items a screenwriter must think about, Ayn Rand does one of them as well as any screenwriter in any movie. 
THE MOVIE
